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

The Texas Hill Country is also a tourist destination with many historical small towns and wineries along the way. REUNION INFORMATION



San Antonio – Home of the Alamo

San Antonio (Spanish for "Saint Anthony"), officially the City of San Antonio, is the seventh most populated city in the United States of America and the second most populated city in the state of Texas, with a population of 1,409,019. It was the fastest growing of the top 10 largest cities in the United States from 2000 to 2010, and the second from 1990 to 2000. The city is located in the Southern United States and the south—central part of Texas, and the southwestern corner of an urban megaregion known as the Texas Triangle.

San Antonio serves as the seat of Bexar County. Recent annexations have extended the city's boundaries into Medina County and, though for only a very tiny area near the city of Garden Ridge, into Comal County. The city has characteristics of other western urban centers in which there are sparsely populated areas and a low density rate outside of the city limits. San Antonio is the center of the San Antonio—New Braunfels Metropolitan Statistical Area. Commonly referred to as Greater San Antonio, the metropolitan area has a population of nearly 2.4 million based on the 2015 US Census estimate, making it the 25th-largest metropolitan area in the United States and third-largest in the state of Texas. Growth along Interstate 35 and Interstate 10 corridors to the north, west and east make it likely that the metropolitan area will continue to expand.

San Antonio was named for Saint Anthony of Padua, whose feast day is on June 13, by a 1691 Spanish expedition in the area. It is notable for Spanish colonial missions, the Alamo, the River Walk, the Tower of the Americas, the Alamo Bowl, and Marriage Island. Commercial entertainment includes SeaWorld and Six Flags Fiesta Texas theme parks, and according to the San Antonio Convention and Visitors Bureau, the city is visited by about 32 million tourists a year. The city is home to the five-

time NBA champion San Antonio Spurs and hosts the annual San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo, one of the largest such events in the country.

The US armed forces have numerous facilities in San Antonio: Fort Sam Houston, Lackland Air Force Base, Randolph Air Force Base (which constitute Joint Base San Antonio), and Lackland AFB/Kelly Field Annex, with Camp Bullis and Camp Stanley located outside the city. Kelly Air Force Base operated out of San Antonio until 2001, when the airfield was transferred to Lackland AFB. The remaining portions of the base were developed as Port San Antonio, an industrial/business park. San Antonio is home to six Fortune 500 companies and the South Texas Medical Center, the only medical research and care provider in the South Texas region.

The missions of the San Antonio Missions National Historical Park along with the Alamo, became part of UNESCO's World Heritage Sites on July 5, 2015. The San Antonio Missions became the 23rd U.S. site on the World Heritage List, which includes the Grand Canyon and the Statue of Liberty.

A flood prevention project in the early 20th century turned into one of San Antonio's most famous tourist attractions when it was improved and commercialized starting with a Worlds Fair event in the 1960s. Today it is the most popular place in the City. The Riverwalk is lined with beautiful trees, flowers and fantastic restaurants and bars. The El Tropicano Hotel, where the reunion will be held, is on the Riverwalk and only about 10 minutes from the best restaurants and the Alamo. A shuttle service and a water taxi are available to transport you to your destination if you prefer not to walk.

The first stop on our planned bus tour on Friday, October 7 is Fredericksburg, Texas. Fredericksburg is located in what is known as the Texas Hill Country and is the seat of Gillespie County. As of the 2010 Census, the city had a population of 10,530.

Fredericksburg was founded in 1846 and named after Prince Finally, we will have lunch on our own at any place you like in Frederick of Prussia. Old-time German residents often referred to Fredericksburg as Fritztown, a nickname that is still used in some businesses. The town is also notable as the home of Texas German, a dialect spoken by the first generations of German settlers who initially refused to learn English. Fredericksburg shares many cultural characteristics with New Braunfels, which had been established by Prince Carl of Solms-Braunfels the previous year. Fredericksburg is the birthplace of Fleet Admiral Chester Nimitz. It is the sister city of Montabaur, Germany. On October 14, 1970, the Fredericksburg Historic District was added to the National Register of Historic Places in Texas.

Fredericksburg is charming and the town still has many old shops and buildings that are standing from the 1800s when they were first built. Most are of a unique blend of German and Texas architecture that took advantage of the abundant limestone rock available to quarry in the area. It is a popular tourist area and the shopping is great. The main street area has numerous shops and boutiques with about anything you can imagine. There are also lots of restaurants and wineries and an authentic German style brewery right on main street.



Fredericksburg is also home to the Nimitz Museum and the National Museum of the Pacific War. Our tour will give those who desire about three hours to tour these fine museums. They are really worth the time and the cost is very minimal. I won't spoil it all, but inside you'll find one of the miniature submarines captured during the attack on Pearl Harbor and a B-25 Mitchell bomber. It is truly a world class World War II museum.

Located in the Texas Hill Country between Fredericksburg and Stonewall, Becker Vineyards was established in 1992 by Richard and Bunny Becker. The winery, located in a 19th century German stone barn reproduction, is surrounded by lavender fields. Featured in Wine Spectator, Food & Wine, the Fine Living Channel and served in The White House, these handcrafted, Bordeaux, Burgundian and Rhone-styled award winning wines are enjoyed with fine cuisine or casual fare. Becker Vineyards is open for tastings, winery/cellar tours, wine gift purchases, wine club and picnicking. There is a possibility we may have a very special Marine Corps guest join us there. I won't tell you who that might be until we have confirmation.

I think many of you have, over the years, seen various squadron and unit vehicles painted up in squadron colors. They are quite common in all the services . They run from luxury cars like the Lincoln Continental shown above to beat up pickup trucks The original livery was black on black and the picture above and even busses. Typically these are owned and maintained by the members of the unit for use by the unit and to increase a later version with silver top.) morale and camaraderie and esprit de corps.

VMGR-352 has such a vehicle. It has been around for over 30 years now and has been used by generations of VMGR-352 squadron members at airshows, events, parades, parties, for public relations purposes and to celebrate unit members personal triumphs like promotions, changes of command and other things.

Over the years, the car has fallen into disrepair and is no longer usable. A now retired Marine, Jacob Cobb, who was with VMGR-352 until last year, has taken it upon himself to restore the old girl to her former glory so the squadron can once again enjoy her for all the reasons stated above.

Background:

The Tanker Lincoln/Raidermobile was originally purchased by some young squadron pilots in 1984. The four original purchasers were Mike "Fergie" Ferguson, "Wild" Bill Armishaw, Chick Kelenfy and Mark Mykityshyn. They found a 1969 Lincoln Continental with "suicide doors" in Yorba Linda, California. Once the car was purchased, other officers joined in the contribution. Those were Doc Olman, John Zeglin, George Walters, Leo Falcum, Bill Abby, Rob Lucy and Craig Laurie.

About the same time, the Oakland Raiders moved to Los Angeles. The Raiders Football Franchise exuded confidence and was always entertaining. They were the scourge of the NFL, winning big at the Super Bowl, all while portraying a rogue image that excited their loyal fans. Mark "Myk" Mykityshyn was a newly minted Marine KC-130 pilot, who had played football at the Naval Academy, and was coaching the squadron flag football team in 1984. He also believed that the squadron needed to get away from its stagnant non-tactical image. Many people in the unit wanted a more dynamic symbol for the future, and thought a new squadron patch would help.

Myk designed a new squadron patch modeled after the branding of the new Los Angeles Raiders and the squadron adopted Raiders as their new call sign. The patch and the call sign are essentially the same today.

The LA Raiders enthusiastically supported the tie between the squadron and the team and offered support including cheerleaders that could attend events for the squadron. Squadron

leadership under Lieutenant Colonel Bruce Major also endorsed the concept, and would later support his officers as they embarked on the search and purchase of a squadron car.

COLONEL BILL BECKER RETIRES



Miramar, California— USS Midway Colonel William "Bill" Becker retired at a ceremony held aboard the USS Midway in San Diego on 4 April, 2016. Col Becker was born at Fort Belvoir, VA and spent his childhood years in Virginia, Maryland and Oregon. His family moved back to Virginia where he graduated from Stonewall Jackson High School in Manassas, VA in 1981. He received a scholarship from the Association of Graduates of West Point and attended George Mason University prior to enlisting in the Marine Corps in November of 1982.

Private Becker attended Recruit Training at Parris Island, SC. He travelled to 29 Palms, CA and completed the Communications Center Operator Course as the Honor Graduate and was promoted from Private to Lance Corporal the same day. LCpl Becker then reported to Marine Corps Recruiting Station, Baltimore.

While on recruiting duty, Cpl Becker was selected for a Naval ROTC Scholarship and attended Oregon State University. Midshipman Becker graduated in May of 1988 receiving Bachelor of Science degrees in both Political Science and History.

2nd Lt Becker attended The Basic School at Quantico then moved on to Naval Flight Training, earning his wings in October of 1990. After receiving initial training in the KC-130 at Cherry Point, NC, he and his family moved to Okinawa for a three year tour.

While in Okinawa, 1st Lt Becker joined the "Sumo's" of sales ass VMGR-152 and served among many duties as the Airframes is a Secon Officer and as Administrative Officer. Rapidly advancing to Aircraft Commander, he was promoted to Captain and returned to Airlines. Quantico for a year in 1994 to attend school.

Capt Becker departed Quantico for El Toro, CA becoming a member of the "Raiders" of VMGR-352. While with the Raiders, he served as Flight Officer and Director of Safety and Standardization deploying to Kuwait for Operation Southern

Watch. He later was attached to 3rd Marine Air Wing staff as the Air Transport Coordination Officer.

In 1998, Capt Becker left active duty and joined the Select Marine Corps Reserve and became a member of the "Rangers" of VMGR-234 in Fort Worth, Texas. He would spend the next nine years with the Rangers serving as Flight Officer, Assistant Operations Officer, Aviation Maintenance Officer, and Executive Officer. Major Becker deployed numerous times to include supporting operations in Kosovo. His years with the Rangers culminated as the squadron mobilized and deployed for Operations Enduring Freedom and Iraqi Freedom from January of 2003 until January of 2005. Late in 2005, LtCol Becker volunteered for orders to support the Joint Task Force in relief efforts for hurricanes Katrina and Rita.

LtCol Becker was selected and honored to command "The Yankees" of VMGR-452 from August 2007 until July 2009. Colonel Becker was promoted to his present rank in March 2009.

Col Becker served in the G-3 and G-5 of 1st Marine Expeditionary Force from May 2010 until January 2015. In May 2011, Col Becker deployed for a year to support Operation Enduring Freedom. He was assigned to NATO Training Mission-Afghanistan as an advisor to the Afghan General Staff. In this combat assignment, he had opportunities to work with 38 coalition partners, scores of senior Afghan Army officers and government leaders while building the Afghan National Army.

Col Becker's most recent assignment was the Chief of Staff IMA for Marine Forces Pacific. He is a Joint Qualified Officer and a graduate of the Joint Forces Staff College Advanced PME course, Marine Corps Command and Staff College, Amphibious Warfare School, Air Force Advanced Airlift Tactics Training Course, and the Reserve Component National Security Course.

Col Becker's personal decorations include the Legion of Merit, Bronze Star, two Meritorious Service Medals, Air Medal with 8 Strike Flight awards, three Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medals and two Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medals.

Col Becker and his wife of 28 years, Susan, reside in California. They have two adult children. Christi, is a software sales associate and graduate of the University of Texas. Brandon, is a Second Lieutenant in the Marine Corps and a graduate of Point Loma Nazarene University. Col Becker is a pilot for United Airlines.

Obituary Emmett Coleman Merricks

Emmett Coleman "EC" Merricks, Jr., 80, of Charlotte went home to be with the Lord April 2, 2016 at CMC Main hospital. The quote on his hospital room door was "In dreams and in love, there are no impossibilities"

Preceding him in death were his father, Emmett Coleman Merricks, Sr; his mother, Desley Allen Merricks; wife and mother of his children, Millie P. Merricks; son, Maxwell E. Merricks; daughter, Susan K. Merricks; and brother, James A. Merricks. Emmett was born in Danville, Virginia on December 9, 1935 and grew up in Reidsville, North Carolina and graduated in 1954 from Reidsville High School, where he excelled in music, cheerleading, and driving school buses. He played the tuba sousaphone and was chosen "Most Talented" and was also chosen as a member of the Key club and a member of the National Guard. Upon graduation, he attended East Carolina University and graduated with a bachelor's degree in Math and serving with Navy ROTC during that time. Emmett married his college sweetheart, Millie, and then enlisted in the United States Marine Corp, serving proudly for twenty years in Quantico, Cherry Point, Hawaii, and Florida with two tours in the Vietnam War. 

Membership Information

Some of this membership information has been published from time to time, but I wanted to update and remind everyone. I've had to set some clear parameters for membership as part of the automation process for the new website and member management database. The software has to have some concrete parameters to work with.

- 1. Membership runs concurrent with the calendar year. That was a change from three years ago. Over the last year I've moved the expiration dates for everyone who had a membership date in the middle of the year forward to 31 December of that year. Now, all memberships expire on that date and renewal is due on January first.
- 2. Since the system is sending automated renewal notices, invoices and receipts it needs to know when to do so. It is set to send a renewal notice on Jan 1st, couple of reminders then to set the membership as expired if it hasn't been paid by 1 March. At that time you're access to the website is turned off.
- 3. Membership statuses are as follows"
 - Active member

 Dues paid for that year
 or renewed in a free status (active duty,
 drilling reserves and widowed spouses).
 - **Pending renewal** Dues expired for less than 60 days.
 - Lapsed/Expired- Dues lapsed for more than 60 days.
 - Renewing member— One who is a current member and pays dues or renews for the current year before 31 December of that year or, if having lapsed more than a year, pays back dues to bring themselves current as a continuous member.
 - New member— One has never been a member.
 - Rejoining Member- One whose membership has lapsed more than a year and then rejoins by paying one year's membership.
 - Active Duty/Drilling Reserve- Active duty and drilling reserve memberships who join for free are updated until the next expiration date. Of 31 Dec. On 1 January the member must renew for free, but establish that they are still on active duty or are a drilling reserve.
 - Widowed Spouses- Widowed spouses of former MCATA members are free and are set to never be notified of renewal.

- 8) And such other lawful purposes from time to time the association may choose to pursue.'


The primary purpose would be # 6 and to provide more opportunities for our members to get together socially than just once a year at the national reunion.

During the discussion it was decided:

- 1. That this chapter would meet quarterly the first, second and fourth quarter of the calendar year, skipping the third quarter in favor of members attending the national convention.

Member in the Spotlight



Mr. Alvia Hearren

One of our most "senior" MCATA members is Mr. Alvia Hearren. Alvia was born in Missouri and raised in Michigan and joined the Marine Corps in August of 1943. He went to boot camp in San Diego and then to aircraft mechanic's school in Norman, Oklahoma before being assigned to VMR-153 at Cherry Point, North Carolina. At the time VMR-153 was flying the R4D, the Navy/Marine Corps version of the C-47,. Alvia started as a ground mechanic, but by December 1944 had moved on to become a flight mechanic. Cherry Point was a brand new base at eh time and there was a lot of construction going on. Alvia says few people had cars and they most went everywhere in the old cattle cars or walked. Alvia had a lot of flight time while at Cherry Point. In those days the VMR squadrons provided transportation around the East Coast area flying from base to base hauling cargo and passengers just as the VMR does today.

Alvia recalled one time landing at Goldsboro on two blown tires and having a pretty rough landing. They brought up new landing gear and by that afternoon they had it installed and were on their way back home. Just like Marines of today, they adapted and overcame. Another time Alvia was on a flight when they took off from the ramp and ran off the end, damaging the ailerons. Alvia patched up the fabric with masking tape and they moved on. After his initial assignment at Cherry Point Alvia was assigned to the Western Pacific to Japan and China by way of Bougainville. There he flew all around China and the area, mostly delivering mail. Alvia tells of one time that they found themselves flying along a river in a ravine with steep sides and clouds all around. The pilot stayed low trying to follow the river and not hit anything. They made it out safely of course, but not without some of the crew being pretty tense. The war was not long over at this time and Alvia had a chance to fly over Nagasaki, the second city hit by an atomic bomb. He describes one building as still standing, but with the insides out of it as if they'd been sucked right out and trees that were perfectly OK except they were neatly laid over where the blast had knocked them down.

Alvia said Japan was mostly destroyed and little rebuilding had been done. He said there was so much debris and people still living in it. He said that on Mondays the children would appear out of nowhere to go to school. You couldn't even tell where people were living.

In 1946 Alvia got off active duty and went to work at the Assembly and Repair Department on the base. He spent the next 32 years and eight months there until he retired as a production control division director with 187 people working for him in 1979.

There was also tragedy in Alvia's life. He lost his brother Raymond in the Korean War. Alvia has this story that he has shared.

The 1954 article, published in The News-Palladium, forerunner of The Herald-Palladium, follows:

"A newspaper office makes and receives dozens of messages and calls a day, sometimes funny, sometimes pathetic, occasionally tragic.

"This week at The News-Palladium, and in most newspaper offices in the U.S., a good many such messages have been sad ones. The Department of Defense has released long lists of GI's missing in action now declared officially dead.

"Yesterday on such a list from Washington of Michigan soldiers was the name of a Benton Harbor GI, Sgt. 1/c Raymond L. Hearren, son of Kelley Hearren, 992 Chicago Avenue.

"In checking files, a reporter noted that there was no picture of the boy and telephoned his home and asked the family if they had one.

"A couple of hours later the boy's father walked into the newspaper office wearing work clothes, direct from his job at the Auto Specialties Manufacturing company in St. Joseph. In his hand was a snapshot of his

"The reporter knew most of Raymond's story from a check of the files.

"The boy had enlisted at the age of 17 in 1947. He had fought in Korea for three years, moving from private first class to sergeant first class. His last leave had been in July 1950, and he had been ordered back in August. In January 1951, he was officially listed as missing in action. There weren't many questions to ask the father.

"'When was the last time you heard from your son?' the reporter in-

"'In November 1950,' Hearren responded.

"'Did he go to school in Benton Harbor?'

"'Yes, he went to grade school here, to the Bard school, he was a bright lad.' the father said.

"'Had you given up hope that he would be found?' asked the reporter.

"This time there was no answer. The reporter looked up and then away. There was no answer because the father couldn't speak for the sudden tears that welled up and rolled down his cheeks.

DISPELLING A MYTH
